Letter Skills



Macmillan Early Skills Program

This activity helps children learn how to alphabetize words correctly.

You need: old magazines scissors

glue 9" × 12" oaktag black marker stapler



Steps:


- Have children look through old magazines to find pictures of different kinds of foods.
- 2. Children will cut out the food pictures and glue them onto $9^{\prime\prime}\times12^{\prime\prime}$ oaktag.
- With a black marker, the teacher labels each picture with the correct food name.
- 4. Staple the food pictures randomly to a bulletin board.
- Ask children to copy the names of the foods in alphabetical order (ABC order).

Variation:

Laminate the food pictures and set up a Food Center. Children may take turns organizing the pictures in alphabetical order.

Follow-up Activities:

- I. The Four Food Groups—Make a worksheet for the children and write the names of the four food groups at the top of the page. Reproduce the page for each child and have children copy the names of the food pictures on the bulletin board in the correct column. (You might want to include a "Junk Food" group on the sheet.)
- Ask each child to make a list of the pictured foods he or she likes and those he or she dislikes. Make a class chart to reflect the children's likes and dislikes.



UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE


Ingredients: 1 stick butter or margarine 1 package yellow cake mix 1 cup brown sugar, tightly packed 29-oz. can of sliced peaches, drained

How to Make:

- Preheat oven to 350°
- Melt the butter or margarine in the bottom of a $9" \times 13"$ cake pan.
- ω Sprinkle brown sugar over the butter.
- 4 Place the peach slices on top of the sugar.
- 5 Prepare the cake mix. Pour the batter over the peaches.
- 6 Bake for approximately 50 minutes.
- Let cool for about 30 minutes. To invert the cake, place a large cookie sheet. (Makes 24-30 servings.) firmly against the pan, turn over the pan so that the cake rests on the cookie sheet over the cake pan. Then, holding the cookie sheet

Ingredients: 1/4 cup butter or margarine 6 cups rice cereal one 4-oz. bag of marshmallows 1 cup peanut butter




How to Make:

- 1. Melt butter or margarine in a saucepan over medium heat.
- 2. Add marshmallows and peanut butter, stirring until all marshmallows have melted
- 3. Add the rice cereal. Mix well.
- 4. Press mixture into a greased 9" × 13" pan.
- 5. Refrigerate. Then cut into bars and serve. (Makes 24 bars.)



Science Activity






















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- 1. With a hammer and nails, punch several holes in the bottom of each coffee can. Remove nails

- Fit a lid on the bottom of each coffee can.

This activity gives children practice in recognizing the different letters of the alphabet.

You need: 12" × 18" white construction paper scissors old magazines (one for each child) glue thumbtacks

Steps:

- Choose a letter of the alphabet and draw a giant version of it on 12" × 18" white construction paper. Cut out the letter.
- Give each child an old magazine. Children will look through their magazines to find as many examples as possible of the particular letter.
- 3. Have children cut out the letters and glue them onto the giant letter.
- Tack the letter onto a bulletin board.

Variations:

- As children become more familiar with the alphabet, this activity can be modified. Have children cut out pictures of objects beginning with the specific letter and glue the pictures onto the giant letter.
- 2. When studying vowel sounds, have your class make a bulletin board display of the letters A, E, I, O, U, and Y.
